CHURCH GIVING – Part I Or A confession of a pastor's financial stewardship.

Knowing that I will be asking members of this congregation to put together a brief "temple talk" or "stewardship article" for the fall, I thought it only fair to take some time and share a bit about my own journey in learning about financial stewardship. One thing that I want to be clear about as I begin is that for the purpose of this article, I will be focusing primarily on the financial end of stewardship; the Treasure as it is sometimes called. everything in our lives including our Time (and how we spend it) and our Talents (the gifts and skills we have been blessed with) as well as our Treasure (finances). But for now, I am going to focus on my stewardship story as it relates to money.

That said, I was not what you might call a very good financial steward in my early years. As a child I would quickly spend every cent I was given almost as soon as I got it; whether at an arcade dumping quarters into video games, or putting coins into the vending machines to get a gumball or some little trinket as we left the supermarket, I spent like a madman. My parents used to tease both me and my brother about this, saying that we acted as if the money was burning a hole in our pockets.

While growing up in church, I can remember that mom and dad would give my brother and I a few dollars each to put into the offering plates, and as I look back on that time, I think this was their way of trying to teach us early on about stewardship, but I can honestly say for myself that it didn't really take. (To be fair, my parents did an excellent job of setting an example, I was simply young and hard-headed)

Fast forward to my early teens, the days of me getting an allowance, and once again, I often spent it all as quickly as possible on toys and games, food and hanging out with friends; seldom did I consider taking from these resources and giving it to the church.

Fast forward again to me and my first job in my late teens, and much the same, I spent primarily for myself. Sure, once in a while in church I might drop a couple of bucks in the plates (the tiny paycheck leftovers that somehow remained in my wallet till Sunday morning) but I didn't really think about what I was doing; rather I saw it (cont. page 5)

This "careless (or perhaps thoughtless) giving" behavior would continue with me through college and would not begin to shift until in Seminary as I began to study the concepts of Biblical stewardship and became more interested in issues of social justice, poverty, and the proper use of wealth.

The changes came slowly, but by the time I began my internship in Rhode Island I was zealously keeping track of my own personal budget, and seeking to be more thoughtful about why and how I gave to the church.

By the time I started my first call, I was looking to find ways to be supportive of the larger mission of the church and started giving directly to the Synod (Upper Susquehanna at the time) and ELCA (Lutheran World Relief, Disaster Relief, and other ministries).

Today, together with my wife Sonja, we continue to do our regular giving through Synodical and ELCA ministries, and naturally we also give to our own congregations to support various local ministries as well.

In the end, it has been quite a journey to get to this point of personal stewardship, and I often feel that I still have much more to learn and more room to grow. Even so, I continue to thank God daily for so many blessings, and I look to continue joyfully returning a portion of those blessings so that others too may thrive in this life through the various ministries of the church.

Having said all this, I would love to hear YOUR personal stewardship story, and better yet I would love it if YOU might write a brief article or be willing to share what stewardship means to you as a brief temple talk to the congregation. (continued page 6) 6

More Ramblings from the Council President By Chris Gerace

Throughout our journeys in life, we sometimes learn from the most unlikely sources. For example, take the 1986 film, "Highlander." Today the film has one of those cult followings, but appeals more to fans of the fantasy film genre. The plot involved a group of "immortals" – master swordsmen who fought to survive throughout centuries of history to modern times. The film featured elaborate historical settings. Also, the subject of sword-making was discussed. One metallurgist mentioned the practice of "folding metal" as part of sword making. An unlikely source, indeed; the film sparked my curiosity so I briefly researched sword making.

To describe the process of folding metal in layman's terms, the sword maker will heat the metal until almost molten, and then hammer it until it becomes thin enough to fold. After being folded, the metal is then cooled. When this process is repeated hundreds of times, the impurities in the metal are removed, the different types of metal elements become evenly distributed and the sword becomes strengthened until it is almost indestructible. Since I am a fan of the film and I had researched this bit of trivia, I have retained the concept of folding metal. But I actually wanted to write about Holy Communion.

I have said it enough to my children over the years, that (to me) one of the most sacred parts of the church service is Communion. I taught them early on to pay attention to the rite of the bread and wine being transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. I told them that each time, a miracle was happening before their very eyes. Then we would go up and humbly receive this most holy gift from God. To me, it's almost overwhelming. I had heard that in the early days of the church in America, Communion was not a frequent event at church services. Before the Industrial Revolution, it took much longer for people to travel, and many only made it to church once per month. Communion was on the schedule less frequently so that it could be served when those travelers could get to church and then more parishioners would be able to receive the gift. But times have long since changed.

Today, some churches elect to serve Communion every week, some serve only during high holy days or once per month and some churches (like ours) fall somewhere in between those two examples. But one thing is clear to me; the frequency of Communion could never diminish the sacredness of this most divine gift from our Lord, hence the term "Sacrament."

Every time I receive Communion, (naturally) I feel unworthy, but I will not turn away this gift to renew my personal covenant with God. To me, every time I receive Communion, it's like folding metal for the sword. Communion strengthens me in my faith, it puts me on a more even keel in dealing with the physical world, and hopefully, it helps to drive out the impurities of sin in my life. And like the sword, the more my "mettle" is folded, the stronger I become in my faith. That is why Communion is so important to me.

Adding to my conviction, only last week a fellow churchgoer who shall remain nameless (but it was Rex Miller) said to me, "I can understand Communion by Intinction for certain times when we have a large attendance, but don't ever take away the traditional Communion. I need to have that moment when I get down on my knees before the altar, before God, and thank Him for all He has given me and for taking away my sins." I was glad to hear someone else's thoughts regarding Holy Communion. So impressed was I with Rex's testimony of faith, that I will be nominating him in December for 2015 Church Council. Sorry for the rambling, but I did want to share my analogy and thoughts. I would be eager to hear your thoughts on Communion some time. I would say, as Christians, we should never pass up the chance to take Communion. No matter how unworthy we might feel sometimes, this is a powerful gift to aid us in our walk with Christ.

Keep folding *your* "mettle." Strengthen your Faith often. God bless!

Our Rally Day program for this year will be a "foretaste of things to come". In an effort to make our Sunday School lessons easier for the children to connect to the worship for the day, we are changing our curriculum to a new venture titled "**WHIRL**". Each week's lesson will be based on the lessons that will be read in worship for that day, commonly known as the lectionary series.

She has written a book and also presents a voice of hope to church and other groups following this tragedy in her life. Other possibilities are an Advent workshop for December's event. Also, the youth presenting a program on "Compassion Child", since they have been involved in sponsoring a child. The movie "Heaven Is For Real" is also being considered for an evening, that would appeal to children, youth and adults.
