You and I find ourselves living in a world that is constantly in flux, constantly changing. For many of us it can be quite the frightening experience to look around and notice how different the world is today compared to even just a few years ago. And even though, biologically speaking, we know that we too are natural creatures of change (we grow, we learn, we adapt) there remains some part of us that desires a shelter from the storm, a safe harbor, a place of continuity and security where we can cling to the ways and practices of old and be in touch with the traditions and connections of our past.

the church. After all, how many other institutions in our society have been around for almost two thousand years and yet still maintain a practice consistent with those of ancient days???

Even so, the Church is not entirely exempt from change. Indeed one can certainly look to the ways in which our expression and understanding of the Christian faith has grown and matured over the centuries. In this, we can experience how like each of us, the Church too is a living, breathing, and growing entity; and it is a place that remains relevant because our practices are ever able to adapt to the needs of the times. Hopefully this same reality is likewise played out in our own personal lives of faith as we daily examine who we are as followers of Christ; certainly this has potential for many life changing outcomes.

Personally, I take daily delight in the sweet irony that the Church of Jesus Christ, the Church that so many outsiders would point to and call archaic, stuck in the past, or irrelevant to the needs of today; that same Church that we Christians cling to as a community of faith and seek sanctuary within, is itself a constant facilitator of change, an institution that has and continues to effect significant change in the world.

The truth is that you and I as followers of Christ, because our absolute and total security is in the Lord; you and I have no need to fear change, indeed **change is part of our tradition**, as Christians and perhaps especially as Lutherans (they didn't call it the GREAT REFORMATION for nothing). Change is always with us and within us, it is part of who we are; it's in our blood both figuratively and literally! It is what God does to us and through us!

To that end God invites us to rejoice in change, to face it with anticipation instead of dread, and to face it with a concern for the needs of others; avoiding the temptation to only look to the needs and wants of ourselves. Therefore, in the midst of all the changes that happen in life, let us endeavor to

Division: The Devil's Favorite Math - Part I of 2 By Chris Gerace

There is a Chinese saying that goes something like this: "Better to be a dog in a peaceful time, than to be a man in a chaotic period." Certainly our world today can be described as a chaotic period. Aside from everything else going on in the world, our US Supreme Court has recently ruled in favor of gay marriages in all fifty states. While it is a historic event, it is one that only seems to add to the polarization of the American public. We might wonder, "Do we really need more controversy? More debate and dissention among us?" Better yet we might wonder, "How should the Christian community tackle this particular topic?"

Before I continue on to "the topic," please allow me to go off on a tangent. There is little denying that Christians in America have certainly experienced challenges from many different sources throughout our lives. Atheists, other religions, church-leavers, biased media, lobbyists, etc., have all in varying degrees challenged or, at times, even misrepresented the Christian Faith. However, there is one criticism from these various sources that I must somewhat agree with, and that is the presence of Christian hypocrisy. [At this point, the reader might be saying, 'who asked you for your opinion?'] Clarification: I am certainly not implying that 100% of Christians are hypocrites. But read on...

The reasons why I have the audacity to bring up Christian hypocrisy come straight from the good book itself. I must ask: "Who in the New Testament does Jesus most rebuke? Does he chastise sinners? No. Most of the Scriptures tell of Jesus chastising the lawmakers and even his own Disciples; the former, for misinterpreting or twisting the Hebrew laws and abusing their power, and the latter for not getting the basic points of His teachings.

We hold the Bible as the most holy of books, but our humanity causes us to relive those very failures and bad attitudes that fill the Bible. Case in point: <u>Christian</u> division.

As Lutherans, it is important to remind ourselves that Martin Luther's ultimate mission was to "reform" (to repair) the Church, not to divide it further. Most religious scholars agree that Martin Luther would be sick if he lived to see a group of Christians separate from the Papacy, form their own group "in protest" and name
